# Freedom of Information request: Right to know request

Thank you for your request for information about "the great British beef debate". Your request was received on 4 December 2023 and we have considered it under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (the "FOI Act").

# Background

Before responding to your question, we would like to provide some background information on Ofcom's complaints procedures and reporting.

Complaints about content standards are handled under *Ofcom's Procedures for investigating* breaches of content standards for television and radio<sup>1</sup>.

Ofcom assesses every complaint it receives. Based on an initial assessment of the complaint and a consideration of the related content, Ofcom will consider whether there may have been a breach of the Broadcasting Code (or other Ofcom codes or licence conditions). In cases where Ofcom considers there may have been a breach, it will launch an investigation. The possible outcomes of an investigation are that we judge an issue is **in breach, resolved or not in breach** of our rules.

Ofcom's Broadcast and On Demand Bulletin, published every fortnight on our website, includes decisions about the complaints we have considered. The Bulletin covers a range of cases, including those which Ofcom has escalated for full investigation, and those which, after careful assessment, Ofcom has decided not to pursue because they did not raise issues warranting investigation. Additionally, programmes that receive over 50 standards complaints in the last week are published in Ofcom's <u>Weekly Audience Complaints Report</u>.

The volume of complaints received may be a consideration in assessing general audience reactions, but it is not determinative as to whether Ofcom will proceed to investigate any given case. Rather, it is the particular issues which have been raised by the complainant(s) which are of primary concern in Ofcom's assessment of a programme.

We have interpreted your request to mean "how many complaints Ofcom received" and that you are referring to the Channel 4 programme *The Big British Beef Battle*.

As published in Ofcom's <u>audience complaints reports</u> for the period of <u>28 November to 4 December</u> <u>2023</u> and <u>5 to 11 December 2023</u>, Ofcom received a total of 224 complaints about this programme.

Please note that this figure does not include any complaints that were made to Channel 4 directly.

#### Information Requests

If you are unhappy with the response you have received in relation to your request for information and/or consider that your request was refused without a reason valid under the law, you may ask for an internal review. If you ask us for an internal review of our decision, it will be subject to an independent review within Ofcom.

The following outcomes are possible:

the original decision is upheld; or

• the original decision is reversed or modified.

#### Timing

If you wish to exercise your right to an internal review **you should contact us within two months of the date of this letter**. There is no statutory deadline for responding to internal reviews and it will depend upon the complexity of the case. However, we aim to conclude all such reviews within 20 working days, and up to 40 working days in exceptional cases. We will keep you informed of the progress of any such review. If you wish to request an internal review, you should contact <u>information.requests@ofcom.org.uk</u>

If you are not content with the outcome of the internal review, you have the right to apply directly to the Information Commissioner for a decision.
