Question 2: Do you agree with the proposals for Public Purpose 1? If not, please explain why.	The Local TV Network (LTVN) is the trade body for the holders of the 34 Ofcom-licensed local TV services. All services deliver local news produced by professional journalists – in many cases these are the only dedicated broadcast news bulletins targeting the local area. Collectively the network has over 5.5 million viewers a month on Freeview Channel 7/8 and former local TV staff now work across the industry.
	LTVN notes the proposal (para 6.32) to remove the condition on the BBC News channel to provide more international news, and more local/regional news than other main continuous news channels in the UK.
	LTVN strongly supports the importance of local news as a public good. Local TV stations collectively broadcast more than 25,000 hours of local content each year We suggest that in order to add value to its own programming, the BBC should be encouraged to cooperate with others who deliver local news and information.

In that context, we strongly support the proposal (para 9.55) for there to be additional transparency around the BBC's delivery of regional news and current affairs in England, in particular that the BBC should set out the total hours of news and current affairs programming on TV it plans to provide on its opt-out services in England, with its Annual Plan, and to report against its delivery with its Annual Report. We would, in addition, welcome additional transparency in the Annual Report on the costs to the licence payer of the BBC's delivery of local news
