NATS cannot agree. We are unable to find any reference to consideration of how these repeaters, when operating in the band up to 2690 MHz, might impact the protection of radar systems operating above 2.7 GHz; this concern was raised in the NATS response to the CFI. When the 2.6 GHz/radar studies and Radar Remediation programme were undertaken and completed with a coordination procedure required of MNOs under the spectrum access licences for the 2.6 GHz band in order to protect radar operations in the adjacent band, Ofcom engaged directly with radar manufacturers and NATS does not have access to information to assess what margins may be available for radars to co-exist with the proposed repeaters. NATS requests assurance from Ofcom as to whether such unplanned repeaters, by definition used outside of that co-ordination procedure, could impact radar operations. If such assurance cannot be given, NATS wishes to engage further with Ofcom and CAA in order to understand the risks involved.
