Is this response confidential? – N It is important that smaller stations, like hospital radio stations have better access to the FM band. While AM has been used in the past by hospital stations, being able to move to FM greatly improves the listener experience.

This would also small stations with limited funds or number of people to ensure they have the funding in place to update all their promotional material, jingles etc.
