<p><b>Question 1: Do you agree that Ofcom should cease to apply the policy to not grant the same applicant more than two SRSLs in a single year, or one SRSL if the service is within the M25?</b></p>	<p>In rural areas like Helensburgh, dwarfed by regional stations and the highly regarded Clyde 1, local events seem to be totally ignored. Therefore restricting special event stations to only two per annum has actively discouraged organisations like ours to go through the hoops only to lose all the sponsorship and volunteers. I therefore totally agree that OFCOM should cease to apply the policy not to grant the same applicant more than two Short-term Restricted Service Licences in a single year.</p>
<p><b>Question 2: Do you agree that Ofcom should cease to apply the policy to not grant SRSLs where the service proposed to be provided does not appear to be different from what is available on the commercial and community services in the area of broadcast?</b></p>	<p>Yes I agree that the policy should cease. This is because as it is a temporary licence the quality and content of the programming will more often than not be live. The voice tracked existing stations and as per recent removal of local requirements for the current services will not be able to offer eh local and live presenter content available to the RSL.
