Local stations are at the heart of every community and can react immediately to provide support where it is needed the most. For example our local station raised £7,000 for our local foodbank in a matter of days during Covid-19 at a time when they needed it the most. They make a difference to those who need it the most in a way big business simply cannot and never will be able to do. Local presenters with passion for our immediate area are invisible friends in most people's homes, cars and workplaces because the content is always relevant to the listener: shows networked generically lose the personal approach and are of little interest. So many vital services will be lost – local travel updates relevant to the area and school closures during bad weather to name just two There is a huge place for local radio and it would be destroyed by a one size fits all approach.
