on income should be marked for a future review setting the minimum figure at say, £20,000, such variation surely permissible within existing powers held by Ofcom. Subconsciously, whilst that level of income may seem achievable, the very nature of community radio is that it is volunteer driven and often grant dependent. Start up, running, and maintenance costs are not immune from increase, and limitations to income generation from revenue raising activities may occur. The sector would be better served in allowing a greater level of income generation and retention without penalty. Also, the present concept assumes economies of scale which simply may not be attainable, particularly in diverse rural communities often best suited to C-DSP.
