No I do not. I do not wish my neighbour to take into his possession any postal object destined for myself. Envelopes often indicate the source and nature of such correspondence or objects. I do not wish my neighbour to be troubled in the slightest degree by having to deal with such items nor that I should be under even the very slightest of obligations to him for doing so. I object also to the suggestion that if I do object to this process that I should signify this by defacing my doors by placing stickers on them close to my letterboxes. Royal Mail can place stickers on its own distribution boxes as it does to convey other instructions to it's delivery staff for such as "Keepsafe". I note that Royal Mail does not intend to review the recent large increases in charges or those propose,d in return for this to be enforced collaboration which is said to increase its efficiency.
