As a Software Engineer and user and creator of Free and Open Source software (FOSS) I am concerned the the proposed content management will prevent the implementation of FOSS that would be needed to view Freeview HD TV channels on Free and Open Source operating systems like GNU/Linux.

I don't believe FRND licensing provision laid out in section 3.7 would allow this problem to be circumvented for a number of reason. Firstly, those restriction are incompatible with free software licenses like the GPL, one of if not the most widely used free software licenses. Secondly, Open Source project are usually community lead, developed by a loose coalition of independent volunteers. There is no 'organisation' that could enter can be negotiated with and agree to, to obtain the license. 'Fair and reasonable' does not necessarily mean within the budget available of volunteers who will not be deriving any income from their work.

This problem would require views wishing to view HD TV on Free/Open source to resort to propriety commercial software vendors. Commercial software vendors have a shown little interest crating application for FOSS operating systems like GNU/Linux. Ultimately limiting viewing of Freeview HD TV to users of commercial operating systems from the likes of Microsoft and Apple.
