Question 1: How should Ofcom manage the process of taking advice from users, regulators and government on efficient apportionment of AIP fees in the maritime and aeronautical sectors? Are any new institutional arrangements needed?:

You should ensure you take the views of any charity organisations into account, and in particular the RNLI

Question 2: If you consider that our proposals for pricing ground station users for any spectrum would be likely to have a detrimental impact on safety, please let us know. In order for us to understand your assessment fully, it would be helpful if you could outline the mechanisms whereby this might happen.?:

I think it will have a considerable detriment on the safety of many people because a) a lifeboat station may not be able to afford to pay the fees and may have to close or b) the money that has to be paid could have be used to purchase other items of equipment which could have a safety impact on either the ability of a lifeboat to rescue people or put the life of the people who operate the boat in danger because I suspect the will still go out to sea with whatever they have, even if they are missing something that would make the job safer.

## Question 3: Do you have any evidence which indicates that AIP charged to ground stations could have a material detrimental impact on UK competitiveness?:

Competitiveness? Are you having a laugh? I think where the RNLI and other charity organisations are concerned the word competitiveness is both insulting and irrelevant. This alone shows that you should enforce this AIP to commercial organisations only.

Question 4: Taking into account the information available in this document, including that set out in Annex 5, our initial views on VHF radiocommunications licence fees and on the reference rates for bands in other uses, and any information you have about the organisations to whom we are proposing to charge fees, please provide any evidence that you think is relevant to us in considering the financial impact of the fees we intend to propose for VHF radiocommunications, or for other uses:

I think it is fairly obvious that if you take money from a charity organisation then they either have to collect more money, or spend less in other areas. If the public knew that £260,000 a year of the money they donate to the RNLI for instance was being spent on this then people may in fact be less inclined to donate (I for one don't donate to any charities that spend money advertising on television for example).

Question 5: Do you agree that there is little to be gained, in terms of economic efficiency, from charging AIP to WT Act licences for aircraft:

Yes, because how would you police it? Chase them?

Yes. In a word. And for the avoidance of doubt, the discount should be 100%, or perhaps a little more. You could in fact spend some of the money collected in donations to such charities. Just think how good the PR would be for the people collecting the money from elsewhere.

Question 7: Do you agree that Ofcom should apply AIP to ground stations? use of maritime and aeronautical VHF radiocommunications channels, to help manage growing congestion in current use and to ensure that the cost of denying access to this spectrum by potential alternative applications is faced by current users?:
