Question 1:To what extent do you consider that DTT, DSat, cable and IPTV are in competition with one another for subscribers of pay TV services ? either at present or in the future?:

Each platform has plus and minus points. However. Opening all platforms up to competition is good as long as the consumer and is put first.

Question 2: To what extent do you consider the Proposal is likely to deliver benefits to the consumer?:

The proposal has the potential to offer benefits to the consumer as long as there is no onus to reinvest in equipment to receive the service or the Freeview platform is not cutback to allow commercial offerings.

Question 3:To what extent do you consider that there is scope for sustainable competition in pay TV on the DTT platform and, more broadly, across all pay TV platforms?:

The trouble with the DTT platform is the capacity is so limited. If after DSO the capacity is increased then there is ample room for commercial ventures. Whilst DSO

has caused confusion amongst consumers, future take up HD services is another potential minefield.

It would be fine if capacity were increased. Perhaps there needs to be a common gatekeeper for encryption services to allow the content providers to have there channels co-exist with competing services and equipment.

Question 5:Do you consider that if Sky were to become the only provider of pay TV on the DTT platform it would be likely to have a significant detrimental effect on competition in the long term? How might this affect the development of other platforms for the delivery of pay TV services?:

Sky becoming the only provider of Pay TV services on DTT would be an absolute disaster for the consumer. They after all already control the DSat platform (although that might change with FreeSat)

Question 6:To what extent, if at all, do you consider that the Proposal would be likely to lead to any of the public policy concerns outlined at Section 4?:

The ability for DTT to accomodate HD services is something which need careful regulation. Ofcom needs to reassess the policy of selling off the spectrum released by the analogue services after DSO
