Ofcom also needs first hand evidence that should the proposed new services be al- lowed, that our radio station, (as well as many others) would be unfairly (and nega- tively) impacted. This will definitely be the case as the proposal will affect LMR by syphoning off listeners, of which are our grass roots business, so that in turn would mean we would face financial ruin.
